INTRODUCTION

TEACHING PHILOSOPHY

We believe our students are the future and that every child has unique talents and potential. As teachers we are here to facilitate students' learning as well as maintain their mental, emotional and physical well-being. HOMEWORK

- Homework is allocated between Monday Thursday
- Homework will need to be completed by Friday
- Reading is to be completed every night. We encourage parents to listen to their child read and
 also to continue to model reading. This assists in the development of expression and fluency,
 which are strongly linked to comprehension development. It is recommended your child reads
 between 15 to 20 minutes a day.
- Mathletics will be assigned for the week. Selected activities support the classroom program and are of great value as they incorporate a range of mathematical vocabulary.
- Spelling and Word Work will be assigned for the week.
- At times throughout the year students may be required to complete projects at home.
- The diary will be used as a communication tool. It would be beneficial for any entries to be signed to confirm the note has been read.

THE CURRICULUM

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

As teachers in a Catholic school we see this area of the curriculum as the most important as it underpins everything we teach. It gives us the opportunity to share our faith and knowledge of the teachings of Jesus with our students. Each term will see the completion of two units.

English

The English curriculum is built around the three interrelated strands of language, literature and literacy. Teaching and learning programs should balance and integrate all three strands. Together, the strands focus on developing students' knowledge, understanding and skills in listening, reading, viewing, speaking, writing and creating. Learning in English builds on concepts, skills and processes developed in earlier years, and teachers will revisit and strengthen these as needed.

Mathematics

The proficiencies reinforce the significance of working mathematically within the content and describe how the content is explored or developed. They provide the language to build in the developmental aspects of the learning of mathematics. The achievement standards reflect the content and encompass the proficiencies.

In Year 5, Humanities and Social Sciences consists of Civics and Citizenship, Economics and Business, Geography and History. Students develop their understanding and application of skills, including questioning and researching, analysing, evaluating, communicating and reflecting. They apply these skills to their daily learning experiences and to investigate events, developments, issues and phenomena, both historical and contemporary.

The Arts

In Year 5, students reflect on the work of varying artists and explore how it influences their own artwork. They select from a range of media, materials and technologies to create original artwork.

Students begin to reflect on the ideas, feelings and opinions communicated in their artwork and consider how presentation will enhance visual appeal/aesthetics and audience engagement.

As they make and respond to artwork, students use visual art terminology to identify and describe how the elements have been used. They have the opportunity to explore the role of art in different times and cultures.

Health

In Year 5, the content provides students with the opportunity to focus on the influence of emotional responses on relationships and to develop skills and strategies to manage changing relationships occurring at key transition points in their lives. They learn about ways they can take action to promote safe and healthy lifestyle practices in a range of contexts. They also focus on the importance of preventive measures to enhance their own health and promote a healthy lifestyle.

Design & Technologies

In Year 5, students have opportunities to learn about technologies in society through different technology contexts as they create solutions in at least one of the following technologies contexts: Engineering principles and systems; Food and fibre production; Food specialisations; and Materials and technologies specialisations. Students are provided with opportunities to produce products and develop an understanding that designs for services and environments meet community needs.

Digital Technologies

In Year 5, students further develop understanding and skills in computational thinking, such as identifying similarities in different problems and describing smaller components of complex systems. They have opportunities to create a range of solutions, such as games and interactive stories and animations that involve branching (choice of options).

STUDENT ABSENTEES

SCHOOL ROUTINES

School begins promptly at 8:40am.

- It is essential that all children are organised and ready to begin their learning at this time.
- Students are expected to be in the classroom before 8.40am. The first bell rings at **8.30am**.
- Students are not permitted to be on the school grounds before 8.15am.
- Staff members are unable to supervise students before 8.15am.
- Students are expected to leave the school grounds by 3.15pm. Playing on the adventure playgrounds and outdoor decking is not allowed.
- No ball games are permitted prior to or after school.

AREAS OF IMPORTANCE

Medical Conditions and Medication

Please ensure your child's medical conditions have been noted at the office and that you keep the file up to date. If puffers, antihistamines etc. are required in an emergency situation please supply the school office with spares and ensure they are clearly labelled with the child's name. If your child requires medication during school hours please take the medication to the office and fill out the relevant forms.

Updating Records

It is important parents notify the office of any changes to their address, phone numbers, medical conditions and emergency contacts.

Collecting Children, Car park and 'Kiss and Drive' areas

Parents are requested to be vigilant when parking their vehicles and using the 'Kiss and Drive' area. For safety reasons, parents are requested to follow the rules when using the car park and 'Kiss and Drive' areas. **Please note NO U-TURNS.**

Allergy Friendly School

St. Columba's School is an 'Allergy Friendly School'. Children are not permitted to bring any nut products to school as some children have life threatening conditions when exposed to nuts and other products. The school's policy is attached to this booklet and parents are requested to read the document and abide by the procedures and rules.

Parent interviews/appointments

Parents are welcome to arrange appointment times throughout the year at short notice. We would appreciate that the time from 8:30 – 8:40am be reserved for children to get organised and to have a chance to speak to the classroom teacher. Appointments can be arranged for after school hours. Diaries and email can be used as a means of communication. <u>Please remind the students to tell the teacher if there is a written communication in the diary</u>.

<u>Uniform</u>

The school has a set uniform which students need to wear and adhere to at all times. Please send in a note if your child is unable to wear the correct uniform. Any student not in the correct uniform will need to explain why they are breaching the school policy. The Uniform Policy can be found on the school website.

COMMUNICATION

Communication between the teacher, students, parents and colleagues is vital in order to receive support to improve learning of each student in the classroom. We value a good relationship between teacher and parents, as we believe there is a need for strong parent support throughout each child's education.
